The first Honors program in Norway

Professor Anders Malthe-Sørensen and Professor Ella Idsøe, both from the Faculty of Mathematics and Natural Sciences at the University of Oslo (Norway), report the following: 'A quite newly released Norwegian White Paper (St. meld. 16 from 2016-2017), "Culture for Quality in Higher Education" opens for developing various forms of support for talented students in higher education. Among them, a big emphasis is on Honors Programs. University of Oslo is the first to embrace this opportunity and starting fall 2019 opens 20 new bachelor positions in an interdisciplinary honors program. The program is developed as cooperation between The Faculty of Humanities and Faculty of Mathematics and Natural Sciences and will have two lines of study: one in science (10 students) and one in humanities (10 students). The program is a three-year bachelor program consisting of a bachelor-degree (180 ECTS) with an honours addition (30 ECTS) for a total of 210 ECTS. Students receive a mentor team that helps developing an individualized study program. The program has an interdisciplinary focus – aiming to provide students with new perspectives on their own disciplines and how it interacts with other disciplines. Each cohort will have a specific theme with a thematic focus the first year, methods in the second year, and an interdisciplinary project in the third year. Honors conference in Russia

Honors is a real international movement. President of the EHC Marca Wolfensberger was invited to give a keynote on honors pedagogies through video-conference at the Honors College Conference in Krasnoyarsk (Russia) on November 30. Also, students from Hanze UAS in the Netherlands and NCHC and EHC members were invited through Skype. The conference was dedicated to discussing purposes and perspectives of establishing and developing honors programs and honors colleges in universities of Russian Federation,

defining strategies and tactics of applying international educational honors standards to practices of Russian universities. During the conference participants discussed the importance of honors program for individual development and personal enhancement of honors students. About 100 people attended the conference.

Russian Honors educators from Moscow, Tyumen, Chelyabinsk and Krasnoyarsk made their presentations at the conference. The recorded videos, as well as the program of the event is available at the conference website hc-conf.sfu-kras.ru

The proceedings of the conference will be published later this month.

Maria Tarasova, the dean of The Honors College of Siberian Federal University, Russia (SibFU) was one of the organizers. She has a program that aims at the development of students' soft skills (critical thinking, effective communication, positive resolutions of conflicts, negotiation skills, creativity, leadership, effective decision making, visual thinking etc.). Tarasova is also interested in more theoretical aspects of honors, for instance in the concept of educational enthusiasm in honors education. We hope to give more insights of her ideas on honors through the Journal of the European Honors Council.

Meeting for Ph.D. students in honors

On Tuesday 5 February 2019 Hanze UAS Groningen (Netherlands) organizes a meeting for Ph.D. students in the subjects honors and talent development in higher education. Students will have the opportunity to present questions for discussions and receive feedback. In 2017 and 2018, Hanze UAS organized similar meetings for students in the Netherlands. Short report: CoTalent mini-conference in Copenhagen, 15-16 November

What are your own views towards talent as a teacher? And how do you spot talents in your students? A group of talent educators from around Europe came together at University College Copenhagen (Denmark) on 15-16 November to discuss these and other questions relating to talent development in higher education. The two-day working event, called the MeTalent YouTalent mini-conference, was the first presentation to the outside world of the EU-funded project Working in Europe to Connect Talent Development in Higher Education (CoTalent). During the two days, focus was on two instruments for teachers developed in the CoTalent project:

1. an instrument to self-evaluate views towards talent development (MeTalent Mirror)
2. an instrument to spot talented students (YouTalent Spotter)

Both instruments consist of different tools. Participants used these tools in practical working sessions and enjoyed inspiring talks by three keynote speakers. A full report on the event and more information on the project can be found at www.cotalentwizard.eu
